Sunday 10th December 2023 The Second Sunday of Advent

These are the first words of the earliest gospel. It is the gospel that will be with us most often during this present Liturgical year. Mark's is also the shortest of the four gospels, and was probably written sometime between 60 and 70 AD. In the first thirty (or so) years of its life the Church had no written gospels. What it had was an oral tradition: memories shared by people who had known Jesus, or who knew people who had known him.

It is "good news," Mark writes, even though there is a strong emphasis throughout on the suffering of Jesus, and the final third of this short gospel is devoted to the last week of his life. How such a tragic story could be good news is the mystery we are plunged into from the opening words. Clearly, it is only with hindsight that anyone could call it good news. That hindsight is provided by the resurrection.

'Provided'? We should not be too quick to provide the solution to this tragic story. The resurrection does not slip into place like the final piece of a jigsaw puzzle. Unlike all the other pieces of a jigsaw puzzle, the last piece is no surprise. But the resurrection is from beyond the frame, so it is right to speak of "the surprise of the resurrection." In Mark's gospel Jesus seems reluctant even to be recognised as the Messiah, the Promised One; he refers to himself only as the "Son of Man," and orders his followers to tell no one about him until after his resurrection (Mark 9:9); this is called the "Messianic Secret".

In this Advent season we are to let the story develop in its own way, so that we too can experience the surprise of the resurrection. We are not advised to skip to the end. And so, like many a story, Mark's gospel begins at a certain distance from the main subject. It begins with John the Baptist. Next Sunday's gospel reading is also about him. The point seems to be that we have to learn to wait – a difficult thing for us who move so fast, and who tend to concentrate on facts rather than their meaning, and who prefer to see results rather than contemplate their causes. Advent is a season of depth, and waiting....

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#### **MESSAGE FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR**

Short days characterised by winter light, overcoats, hats, and scarfs...these are things we can associate with early December days. And interwoven with them is the Advent invitation to ponder anew our relationship with Christ and its implications. To support our spiritual engagement the Church presents us with the opening lines of St. Mark's Gospel. Here the prophetic words of Isaiah are proclaimed afresh. Those who hunger a life-giving word or caress from God, are reminded that He has fulfilled an ancient and enduring promise. The great messenger He foretold has come and gone but his words, owing to their relevance, linger. John the Baptist's mission of leading a fallen humanity back to God continues this day, this place, this hour. Mark announces his Gospel as the Good News of Jesus Christ by going back into history, and more specifically, by linking the words of Isaiah with the baptism of repentance proclaimed and administered by John. This paragon of austerity is presented to us as a preacher in the wilderness. Those who wish to hear him must leave the comfort of their surroundings. They are drawn away from the distractions of their daily existence by a hope for fulfilment. Would that we might also hear and obey the word he offers!

We are told of the dominant theme of John's preaching – that one more powerful that he would come after him, one who would baptise, not with water, but in the Holy Spirit.

We have gathered in the name of this powerful One. Our presence and participation in the Eucharist suggests we are beneficiaries of John's ministry. Our lives have been graced by the One he proclaimed, our Lord Jesus Christ. The One more powerful that John has already communicated himself to us. He has begun something in each of us, something a long time in the planning, something glorious in Christ. Despite all that is wrong in our world, today is a happy day for us. Our 'salvation' is underway. God is forever drawing us away from a dim and unexciting existence into His own glorious self-giving life. Once again, we are being invited to be people of hope and courage, accepting God's willingness to step into our lives and lead us toward our true home! Whatever our problems in life, we have a right be joyful and to celebrate 'Emmanuel – God with us'.
