The Fifth Sunday of Ordinary Time

The rushed and crowded atmosphere of Mark's gospel is very evident here. There are people everywhere, not only the ones mentioned by name, but "all who were sick or possessed by demons," and, as if that were not enough, "the whole city was gathered around the door." Clearly he was exhausted by it, so next morning "while it was still very dark, he got up and went out to a deserted place, and there he prayed." But even then they came "hunting for him." "Everyone is searching for you," they said.

Still, in that push of the crowd he saw individual people, not a crowd. He had time for Peter's mother-in-law. I have seen a great figure in public, shaking hands with rows of people, but never looking at the person whose hand he was shaking, always looking at the next person. It is as if only the abstract crowd existed, not individuals. There was a debate a few years ago between two cardinals about the relationship of the universal Church to local Churches. One held that the essence of the Church is found properly in the universal Church, while local Churches are limited manifestations of it. The other said the universal Church was just the sum of all local Churches. It reminded me of a remark by the German philosopher Hegel, "Would anyone who wished for fruit reject cherries, pears, and grapes, on the grounds that they were only cherries, pears, or grapes, and not 'universal fruit'?" Abstract ideas can run away with us and make us downplay concrete reality. This is not how Jesus thought and acted.

The great 19th-century preacher, C.H. Spurgeon, wrote: "Very interesting is this little peep into the house of the Fisherman. We see at once...the Lord's gracious work upon one's own flesh and blood.... Peter's house was probably a poor fisherman's hut, but the Lord of Glory entered it, lodged in it, and wrought a miracle in it.... God is oftener in little huts than in rich palaces. Jesus is looking around your room now, and is waiting to be gracious to you."

Jesus went "proclaiming the message and casting out demons." In the early chapters of Mark's gospel the emphasis is less on the content of his preaching than on its effects. For example, the leper who was cleansed went away and "spread the word," but of course the word was word of his healing (1:45). We sometimes speak of the Christian 'message' as if it could be written on a piece of paper. But it is a healing, life-giving and liberating word. It is nothing if it is only abstract talk.

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MESSAGE FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR

In the readings of the Mass this weekend, we encounter a very depressed Job, and we see the sick and troubled of Capernaum gather round the door of the house where the Messiah is staying in the hope of a cure.

Although healing was part of Jesus' ministry it was clearly not as central to His ministry as was preaching. He healed because of His compassion for the sick and afflicted and because of the expectations that the Messiah would heal. He, however, realised that it was not His remit to put an end to all suffering. In his preaching there is a deep acknowledgement that suffering exists and that suffering will continue to exist. We find this realisation for example in the Beatitudes: happy are the poor, happy are those who mourn and those who are persecuted. He, Himself, expects to suffer 'the Son of Man is destined to suffer grievously' and He also expects his followers to suffer 'you cannot be my disciple unless you are willing to take up your cross every day and come after me'! That He resembled all of us in His dislike for suffering is evident in His words in Gethsemane, 'Father, if it is possible let this chalice pass from me'! Yet His wish was that the Father's will, not His, should prevail and He subsequently triumphed over the physical, mental, and emotional sufferings that came to Him in the last hours of His earthly life.

Down through the ages sufferers have derived strength from praying before the crucifix. As they looked on the figure hanging there, they felt they were praying to someone who had experienced life's pains at their sharpest, who have been through tiredness, hunger, sleeplessness, anxiety, betrayal, as well as physical, mental and emotional torture.

Throughout His ministry He showed us how to grow through suffering: He never tried to explain the mystery of suffering. He lived a life of sacrifice and advocated the philosophy that 'he who loses his life shall find it'. On Easter Day that philosophy was vindicated when 'the stone rejected by the builders became the corner stone'.

This was the time when it was strikingly clear that the Messianic ministry of Jesus was not to be one of power, privilege, or politics but a ministry of devoted service to the Father, in which obedience was learned through suffering even though suffering on a cross.

Suffering remains a mystery. We do not understand it because we do not understand the mind of God but the God-man has at least shown us that there is no disgrace in suffering, that it provides a tremendous opportunity for spiritual growth and that it is in losing life that we find it.

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
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
