Sunday 11th August 2024 The Nineteenth Sunday in Ordinary Time

"The night is dark and I am far from home, / Lead thou me on..." wrote John Henry Newman. He wrote that hymn, Lead Kindly Light, on board ship from Italy to England, when he was gravely ill and believed himself to be dying. "I do no ask to see / the distant scene; one step enough for me." We instinctively see our life as a journey, never more keenly than when we think the journey is nearly over. They say 'seasons of life'. Our life is like the seasons of the year in little: from the Spring and Summer of youth to the Autumn, and eventually Winter.... The same life-pattern is inscribed on each day: in the morning you emerge from your bed as from a womb; then the day moves through its phases until late at night all you want to do is lie down and sleep. The pattern of your whole life is appears in every portion of it.

Elijah went a day's journey into the desert, sat down under a broom tree and prayed that he might die. "I've had enough, Lord," he said. Anyone reading that story (today's first reading) will know that it is not just a story about one man on a particular day; it is the story of everyone's life. An angel touched Elijah and said, "Get up and eat, for the journey is too much for you!" Strengthened by that food he travelled for forty days and forty nights until he reached the mountain of God. This ancient story is recalled in today's Liturgy because it reminds us of the Eucharist.

Like most stories, it is more than a list of facts; it is a prose poem about human life. Life is long and often very hard. "I've had enough!" said Elijah - and with him every human being at some time in their life. The journey is too much for you, said the angel; you need help. You will get nowhere with the meagre provisions you brought with you. You will never reach 'the mountain of God': you will die without discovering the deepest meaning and fulfilment of your life.

"I am the bread of life," Jesus said. "The bread that I will give... is my flesh." Eating is assimilation: the food becomes the very substance of what you are. I know a priest who says (quoting St Augustine) "Receive what you are!" as he distributes Communion at Mass. As Augustine wrote, "Bread is a quantity of grains baked together into one mass.... To eat that bread is to dwell in Christ and Christ in you."

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MESSAGE FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR

What does the bread of life mean? We need bread to live. Those who are hungry do not ask for refined and expensive food, they ask for bread. Those who are unemployed do not ask for enormous wages, but the 'bread' of employment. Jesus reveals himself as bread, that is, the essential, which is necessary for everyday life; without Him it does not work. Not one bread among many others, but the bread of life. In other words, without Him rather than living, we get by: because He alone nourishes the soul; He alone forgives us from that evil that we cannot overcome on our own; He alone makes us feel loved even if everyone else disappoints us; He alone gives us the strength to forgive in difficulties; He alone gives that peace to the heart that it is searching for; He alone gives eternal life when life here on earth ends. He is the essential bread of life.

These words of the Lord reawaken in us our amazement for the gift of the Eucharist. NO one in this world, as much as they might love another person, can make themselves become food for them. God did so, and does so, for us.

And He is interested in every aspect of our life. We can tell Him about what we are feeling, our work, our day, our heartache, our anguish, so many things. We can tell Him everything because Jesus wants this intimacy with us.

At least once a day we find ourselves eating together; perhaps in the evening with our family after a day of work or study. It would be lovely, before breaking bread, to invite Jesus, the bread of life, to ask Him simply to bless what we have done and what we have failed to do. Let us invite Him into our home; lets us pray at home. Jesus will be at the table with us and we will be fed by a greater love.


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
