Sunday 25th August 2024 The Twenty First Sunday in Ordinary Time

The Christian faith was known as "the Way" before it was known as Christianity (Acts 9:2; 11:26). It is a journey on which we are invited, not a system of thought and behaviour that we set up for ourselves. The initiative is God's, who "first loved us " (1 John 4:19). "You did not choose me but I chose you," Jesus said (John 15:16). As Leo the Great (440 AD - 461) said, "Jesus is the hand of God's mercy stretched out to us."

An invitation calls for a choice: acceptance or refusal. This is the theme of the readings at today's Mass. In the Old Testament reading, Joshua (whose name, incidentally, is the Hebrew form of Jesus) said to the people, "Choose today whom you wish to serve." The "gods beyond the river," no doubt, had their attractions; they probably demanded less and could be easily manipulated. Joshua's God was more demanding.

In the gospel reading Jesus asks his disciples to make a similar choice. For Peter there was no contest: "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the message of eternal life." But later the same Peter would not be so clear-sighted in practice; at a crucial moment he dissociated himself emphatically from Jesus: "I do not know the man!" (Matthew 26:74). Later again, even after the Resurrection, he was trying to have it both ways, and Paul had to "oppose him to his face, because he stood self-condemned" (Galatians 2:11). Clearly, a profession of faith is more easily said than done.

Joshua had said, "God is a jealous God" (Joshua 24:19). What sense does it make to speak of the jealousy of God? It is a large theme in the Old Testament. In one place, 'Jealousy' is even said to be God's name (Exodus 34:14). The human emotion of jealousy is usually so neurotic that we have to adjust it considerably before applying it to God. When human jealousy goes too far, it elicits weary and dull responses: "Of course I love you." If we don't understand God's jealously we may get into the habit of saying the right things, but without sincerity, as in a stale marriage.

But there is right jealously. If parents saw their daughter getting into an intense friendship with an unprincipled ruffian, they would be very jealous indeed! This does not mean that they want to keep her locked up forever. They want her to meet people who will not use her as a plaything, but instead respect and love her. Their jealousy is an expression of their love. Likewise God, only infinitely more so. God is absolute. This means that God is not prepared to be part of anything. A God who was less than absolute would only be a plaything for human beings. Likewise the demands of Jesus are absolute. They can be rejected, but they cannot be diluted. Why? Because that is the nature of love.

A reading from the book of Joshua

24:1-2.15-18

Joshua gathered all the tribes of Israel together at Shechem; then he called the elders, leaders, judges and scribes of Israel, and they presented themselves before God. Then Joshua said to all the people: 'If you will not serve the Lord, choose today whom you wish to serve, whether the gods that your ancestors served beyond the River, or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are now living. As for me and my House, we will serve the Lord.'

The people answered, 'We have no intention of deserting the Lord our God who brought us and our ancestors out of the land of Egypt, the house of slavery, who worked those great wonders before our eyes and preserved us all along the way we travelled and among all the peoples through whom we journeyed. We too will serve the Lord, for he is our God.'

SECOND READING

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Ephesians 5:21-32

Give way to one another in obedience to Christ. Wives should regard their husbands as they regard the Lord, since as Christ is head of the Church and saves the whole body, so is a husband the head of his wife; and as the Church submits to Christ, so should wives to their husbands, in everything. Husbands should love their wives just as Christ loved the Church and sacrificed himself for her to make her holy. He made her clean by washing her in water with a form of words, so that when he took her to himself she would be glorious, with no speck or wrinkle or anything like that, but holy and faultless. In the same way, husbands must love their wives as they love their own bodies; for a man to love his wife is for him to love himself. A man never hates his own body, but he feeds it and looks after it; and that is the way Christ treats the Church, because it is his body – and we are its living parts. For this reason, a man must leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two will become one body. This mystery has many implications; but I am saying it applies to Christ and to the Church.

Pray, brothers and sisters, that my sacrifice and yours may be acceptable to God, the almighty Father.

All: May the Lord accept the sacrifice at your hands for the praise and glory of his name, for our good and the good of all his holy Church.

Priest: Therefore, as we celebrate the memorial of his Death and Resurrection, we offer you, Lord, the Bread of life and the Chalice of salvation, giving thanks that you have held us worthy to be in your presence and minister to you.

> Humbly we pray that, partaking of the Body and Blood of Christ, we may be gathered into one by the Holy Spirit.

Remember, Lord, your Church, spread throughout the world, and bring her to the fullness of charity, together with Francis our Pope and N. our Bishop and all the clergy.

MESSAGE FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR

Commitment is the key to the scripture readings this weekend. In the first reading we hear how Joshua is facing the end of his days, and he wants his people to know who they are before God. He reminds His people of all that God has done on their behalf and after working the crowd to a high emotional pitch, he thunders out His message. 'Decide whom you shall serve, as for me and my household we shall serve the Lord!' The situation John describes in the Gospel this weekend is quite different. Jesus' bread of life talk has caused such division that the majority of his disciples were leaving Him – they could not accept that he was actually the bread come down from heaven.

There are times in the life of all of us when we are simply pushed to the wall, ready to quit. We see in the Gospel this weekend when the disciples of Jesus are pressurised – their faith in Jesus challenged severely by what Jesus said earlier about giving them His body to eat. So, the disciples respond to the challenge in two ways. One finds Jesus' words too hard to take, they part company with him and no longer walk with Him. The second group meets the challenge and remains faithful to Jesus. When pushed to the wall, they kept their eyes firmly focused on Jesus; the problems posed by what Jesus had said didn't distract them. As when Jesus tells His disciples about the Eucharist, there will be times in all our lives when our faith will be challenged. We may even have been tempted ourselves to part company with Jesus and His church and walk with Him no more. So, let us not fix our attention so much on the problem but on the person of Jesus, affirming our faith in Him as Peter did and said, 'Lord you have the words that give eternal life... we believe...that you are the Holy One that comes from God.'
