"Our social fabric militates against relation," wrote G.W. Morgan in Prophetic Voices. "Competitiveness pervades everything we do and is taught from the time we are small children.... Our fundamental stance is not to respond to others, but to outdo them, vie with them, beat them."

This seems to be true of every business; and when we make a business of religion it is true in that field too. The scurrilous polemics between Christian Churches in the past seem scandalous now, but they probably seemed normal in their time.

In the first reading at today's Mass we see how Moses regarded the 'opposition', and in the gospel reading we see Jesus. A young man ran to delate some unofficial prophets. "The young man ran to tell Moses: 'Look,' he said, 'Eldad and Medad are prophesying in the camp.'" Moses' response showed a wonderful generosity of spirit: "If only the whole people of the Lord were prophets, and the Lord gave his Spirit to them all!" The situation in the gospel reading is an exact parallel, and Jesus' response is just like that of Moses. "Anyone who is not against us is for

The lesson is that the Holy Spirit is nobody's property, and blows wherever it wills (John 3:8). The Holy Spirit is God's gift to the Church, but the Holy Spirit is not restricted to acting in ways that we alone can recognise. No created reality can fully embody or express the freedom of God. The Church is always in danger of hardening into a sect, just as every believer is in danger of hardening into a self-righteous reactionary.

But the very qualities that are considered vices in an individual can sometimes be made to appear virtues in an organisation. Today's readings are like a road-sign that says No Entry on that road.

In the document Nostra Aetate, the Second Vatican Council stated: "The Catholic Church rejects nothing that is true and holy in these [non-Christian] religions. She regards with sincere reverence those ways of conduct and of life, those precepts and teachings which, though differing in many aspects from the ones she holds and sets forth, nonetheless often reflect a ray of that Truth which enlightens all people." This is not a sell-out, as some have claimed; it is in the spirit of Christ, who praised the "faith" even of a pagan Roman centurion (Matthew 8:10). Only a truth that is very unsure of itself feels always compelled to make an enemy of the other.

This has relevance for us at the individual level too. As Raniero Cantalamessa put it, "We are to watch with joy, not with jealousy, the many who prophesy and cast out demons, thus contributing to authentic human development." And C.S. Lewis remarked that it would be very surprising if the Light of the World, Christ, were not reflected in some way in every part of the world. When we see good being done by anyone, Christian or not, we see the grace of Christ's face, in full light or in shadow.

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MESSAGE FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR

Is there not a temptation in every religion and even within religions to elitism and exclusivity? It is a very dangerous attitude and one which we need to be aware of and understand. In the Gospel this weekend John, the beloved disciple, succumbs to this temptation. 'We saw this man', he complains, 'who was not one of us casting our devils in your name; and because he was not one of us, we tried to stop him'. Jesus told him that he should not stop such people. And he gives a very important principle. 'Anyone who is not against us is for us'.

Jesus gives us many examples from His own life confirming this. He asked a Samaritan woman for a drink of water when he sat down tired by the well. The Samaritans were the hated enemies of the Jews because they were seen as heretics and destined for damnation. It would have been unthinkable for a Jew to speak to a pagan Samaritan. And, above all, to a woman who was alone and therefore of doubtful reputation. But Jesus came to show us that God was the Father of us all and welcomes everyone irrespective of labels. Jesus showed this in many encounters with other so-called sinners – prostitutes, tax collectors, public sinners, people who didn't attend the Sabbath synagogue worship etc.

The readings this weekend teach us that we are free from the belief that we are the only ones representing God in this world. God is not interested in labels: Catholic, Protestant, Muslim, Animist, Hindu, Sikh, Buddhist etc. He is underlining the great truth that the essence of following Jesus is found in the way we live love. Very simple, but how very demanding. Love alone counts. A simple Taizé chant puts it this way: 'where there is love, there is God'. The basis of Jesus' ministry was hospitality and welcome. He was not in the slightest prejudiced. What of us?

The real challenge of the Gospel is whether we accept that the Spirit of God today works wherever God wishes and through whomsoever is chosen.

Relics of St. Bernadette Soubirous

The relics of St. Bernadette Soubirous will arrive in the Cathedral of Ss. Patrick & Colman on Thursday 17th October. The relics will be available for veneration after the liturgy of welcome. The relics will remain in the Cathedral on Thursday and all-day Friday until 10.00pm. On Saturday 19th October the relics will be taken to St. Patrick's Cathedral, Armagh. There will be several opportunities for prayer during the two days. These will include a Mass with the anointing of the sick, the Rosary, the Chaplet of Divine Mercy, Candlelit procession. Once the timetable has been finally agreed, we will publish it in the bulletin and on the website.

St. Bernadette was born in Lourdes, a small town in the foothills of the Pyrenees Mountains in the year 1844. She was born into a poor but loving family, who suffered many hardships. Bernadette was a simple, pleasant girl uneducated and small in stature.

In 1858, she saw the Virgin Mary eighteen times at the Grotto of Massabiellle: the Apparitions of Lourdes were authenticated in 1866 by the Bishop of Tarbes. Bernadette entered the community of the Sisters of Charity of Nevers.

She became seriously ill with tuberculosis of the lungs and bones and died at the age of 35. She was proclaimed Blessed in

1925, and a Saint in 1933.

Bernadette's body was exhumed on 18th April 1925 for her beatification. It was found to be uncorrupted. It was then decided to place it in the Chapel of the Sisters of Nevers, where it is still visible today.
