Jesus is now twelve years old, on the threshold of adulthood. Already there is a hint of what is to come: he must be "in his Father's house." The enclosing circle of family opens to the greater world. There is pain in the opening, because life is not idyllic for long; it is tragic, which means it is destined for unimaginable greatness. Just how great, we would never know but for that small Child born so long ago, so far away.

He had caused a delay of five days: his parents had to return to the city, a day's journey, and then spend three days searching for him, before making their way back again to where they were when they first missed him. I have seen one or two mothers whose child went missing for an hour or so, and it is a chilling sight; it must be an unimaginable feeling, save for parents who have experienced it. For four of those five days, Mary and Joseph knew that feeling. There is no explosion of anger or impatience in Luke's description of their meeting: "When his parents saw him they were astonished," and "Child, why have you treated us like this?" Later piety made more of it, commemorating it as the fifth joyful mystery of the Rosary. It could equally well have been a sorrowful mystery, had people concentrated their piety on the other four days: the loss of the child Jesus. Joy and sorrow are often so closely linked as to be inseparable. It must be especially true for parents. Why do we keep the joyful, the sorrowful and the glorious mysteries so separated - even consigning them, in the Rosary, to different days of the week?

Homework: see how many of the mysteries could fit in more than one category!

How did Jesus manage to get lost in the Temple if he was an only child? The fact is that he was part of an oriental family, which is usually about a hundred people! - uncles, aunts, innumerable cousins, their wives, their children, their mothers-in-law... a tribe! But we make such lonely-looking statues of the Holy Family: just three people, a nuclear family. The metaphor is chillingly accurate: we reduce the extended family to a little group of three, as scientists see solid objects as atoms. The word 'atom' means 'indivisible', but that became a challenge: how to split it! It was done, as we know, releasing nuclear energy which no one knows how to control ultimately; its waste will still be deadly tens of thousands of years hence. We do something similar with society, splitting it into little nuclear families, which, we used to say, were 'indissoluble'. But, as in the case of the scientists, this seemed to operate only as a challenge, and now in some countries as many as fifty percent of all marriages are dissolved. As we celebrate the Holy Family we must think of ways to strengthen and support the family.

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#### MESSAGE FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR

The Holy Family of Jesus, Mary & Joseph. How must Mary have felt upon finding Jesus, sitting in the temple among the teachers, completely unbothered and seemingly oblivious to their concerns. Did Mary do a double take, trying to reconcile the young man in front of her with the baby, 'wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger.' Did she fight off visions of where it all might end up, hearing echoes of Simeon's prophecy about her child's destiny? Did she wonder about the day when she would lose Jesus, when she would let Him go for the last time, and not by accident.

The Gospel this weekend is a story of growth, but it's not just about Jesus' maturation from infant, to youth, to man. It is just about Mary and Joseph, their growth. Me and you, and our growth. Growing up is not about how old we are ultimately. It is really about moving into deeper and more authentic relationships with God, our world, each other, and ourselves. It is Jesus, here in this story certainly, but also in our lives who grows us up. He is the one who will grow up Mary and Joseph. Children have a way of doing that to the adults in their life. They challenge us to look at our world, our lives, and ourselves, in new, different and sometimes painful ways – 'Why have you treated us like this?'

Mary's question, entirely relatable, is ultimately about her; as if Jesus' actions were about her, rather than about Him. And isn't this a pretty honest depiction of parenthood, of personhood. Our tendency to take it personally; to define ourselves by our relationships with others; to believe that the actions of someone else have everything to do with us? That one's children, but also spouses, family and friends orbit us; belong to us; act as extensions of us.

The Holy Family, as it turns out, faced the truth that we all must face: The children in a family are not necessarily their children. Their children belong to someone else. And so do we.

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


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
