'If living conditions continue to improve in this country,' someone said, 'we're going to run out of humble beginnings for our great men.' Humble beginnings have to be part of the story, because people like to be able to look down so that they can see how high they have climbed. Power and wealth are a real religion, with devotees all over the world, with its holy land-the wealthiest countries-and its holy cities, the financial capitals of the world. It has its temples, the banks, often the finest buildings in town. It has its ardent preachers, the advertisers. It even has its heroic stories that read just like the lives of the saints. A young boy from a poor family (read 'a hopeless sinner') begins with a paper round, gets a job as an office-boy, climbs, climbs, till he becomes a big man in the company; then he clinches his salvation by marrying into the company via the boss's daughter ('the unitive way, the mystical espousals').

It is God's greatest rival: the religion of Mammon. 'You cannot serve God and money,' Jesus said (Matthew 6:24; Luke 16:13). This is because money has the capacity to touch the very depths of our soul. How can it do that? It has no poetry! There are no poems about money: I can't think of a single example. It could be that it only takes over souls that have no capacity for poetry. 'If you want to see what God thinks of money,' someone said, 'look at the people he gives it to!' In itself it is not an interesting subject. It is our need and our greed that lend it interest. It is, above all, a promise: that essential component of any religion.

Its promises, however, are always just for oneself (or one's family: one's larger self). Listen to the advertisers. The underlying creed is that life has nothing to offer but what can be purchased or won, and that there is nothing either good or bad beyond that. All others are either partners or competitors: people who can help or hinder you in your search for more of I am thinking, of course, of pure devotees. Many, as in every religion, are not true believers, or have mixed motives. There are wealthy people who have a real care for the half of the world that is malnourished. But there are others, like the rich man in the parable, who don't even notice Lazarus at their door, and who are therefore able to step over him without malice, keeping their own self-esteem intact. And there are others again who notice Lazarus but keep their self-esteem by throwing him a few scraps.

The religion of Mammon is a destructive cult. It not only destroys the poor by enriching its devotees at their expense, but it destroys the devotees themselves. They are creating 'a great chasm' between themselves and the rest of humanity, so that 'those who might want to pass from here to you cannot do so, and no one can cross from there to us.'

Which characters does the story ask us to identify ourselves with? The rich man, named Dives in older translations? In fact he is given no name in the gospels: 'dives' is just the Latin word for 'a rich man'; 'plousios' in Greek. The rich man has no identity except his wealth. No, we are not being asked to see ourselves as Dives. Lazarus, then? No, neither is it telling us to lie down at the rich man's door like Lazarus. The parable is telling us that we are the rich man's five brothers.

We have Moses and the prophets – but above all we have Jesus – to tell us to live by a different religion, a subversive religion that 'casts down the mighty from their thrones and exalts the lowly, that fills the hungry with good things but sends the rich away empty.' We are not told whether the five brothers changed their lives around. Why? Because we are the five brothers, and the story isn't over yet.

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MESSAGE FROM THE ADMINISTRATOR

The Gospel this weekend helps us understand what it means to love, and more than anything how to avoid certain risks. In the parable there is a rich man who does not notice Lazarus, a poor man who was' 'at his gate'. This rich man, in fact, does not do evil towards anyone; nothing says that he is a bad man. But he has a sickness much greater than Lazarus, who was 'full of sores'. This rich man suffers from terrible blindness, because he is not able to look beyond his world, made of fine banquets and fine clothing. He cannot see beyond the door of his house where Lazarus lies, because what is happening outside does not interest him. He does not see with his eyes, because he cannot feel with his heart. For into it a worldliness has entered which anesthetises the soul. This worldliness is like a 'black hole' that swallows up what is good, which extinguishes love, because it consumes everything in its very self. And so here a person sees only outward appearances, no longer noticing others because one has become indifferent to everyone. The one who suffers from grave blindness often takes on 'squinting' behaviour: he looks with adulation at famous people, of high rank, admired by the world, yet turns his gaze away from the many Lazuruses of today, from the poor, from the suffering who are the Lord's beloved.

But the Lord looks at those who are neglected and discarded by the world. Lazarus is the only one named in all of Jesus' parables. His name means 'God helps'. God does not forget him; He will welcome him; he will welcome him to the banquet in His Kingdom, together with Abram, in communion with all who suffer. The rich man in the parable, on the other hand, does not even have a name; his life passes by forgotten, because whoever lives for himself does not write history. He or she must go out from themselves, to write history! But whoever lives for themselves cannot write history.


